Practicing What You Preach

A couple of Sundays ago, I didn't like my sermon. There was something missing in it, but even after a night of wrestling with it, I still couldn't figure out what was wrong. The next morning, Sunday morning, I drafted a new sermon; yet, I wasn't happy with that one either. By the time worship was to start, I hadn't decided which sermon I was going to preach: sermon A (Saturday night's sermon) or sermon B (Sunday morning's sermon). I decided to leave the choice to my husband who chose sermon A (the one he had already read). When I got up to preach, I shared my sermon troubles with the congregation. I joked that if the sermon wasn't good it was my husband's fault; to which he replied that I was the one who wrote the sermon. We all laughed and church went on with Sermon A.

After church, as I was standing in the narthex shaking hands and visiting, someone mentioned my sermon-choosing woes and then pointed my attention to the title of the sermon that day: "God's Promise of Guidance." I chuckled and said, "I guess the pastor needs to practice what she preaches."

The whole experience got me thinking: why is it so hard to practice what we preach . . . to make our spiritual walk match our spiritual talk? Whether you are a pastor, priest, church secretary, member of the choir, member of the church, or a visitor to a congregation, we all fail to do what we say we will do. We all fail to live the lives Christ calls us to live, lives of love: loving God, neighbor, and enemy, with not just our words but our actions.

Why do we do this? Because we are human beings who sin. We seek after our own self-interest rather than the interest of others. We are more concerned about getting what we believe we deserve than making sure that another gets what he or she needs to live. We focus on ourselves to the detriment of our community. We may want to do good, but the sin of selfishness and pride gets in the way. I love how the Apostle Paul puts it when he writes in Romans 7:15-20 (NIV):



15 I do not understand what I do. For what I want to do I do not do, but what I hate I do. 16 And if I do what I do not want to do, I agree that the law is good. 17 As it is, it is no longer I myself who do it, but it is sin living in me. 18 For I know that good itself does not dwell in me, that is, in my sinful nature. [a] For I have the desire to do what is good, but I cannot carry it out. 19 For I do not do the good I want to do, but the evil I do not want to do—this I keep on doing.

All of us are sinners, but the good news is that none of us are without hope. Yes, none of us will practice what we preach with perfection, even pastors, yet, with God's grace, forgiveness, and love working in us, it is possible to practice what we preach sometimes; it is possible to do the good we want to do; and it is possible to be the good creation God made us when He created the world. With God all things are possible, and that is a promise worth remembering even if you fail to practice what you preach.





Lenten Sermon Series: God's Love Shines in the Darkness

Our Lenten Sermon Series this year is entitled "God's Love Shines in the Darkness." We live in the darkness of a sinful world with its wars and rumors of wars, hatred and prejudice, and fear and fear-mongering. They're Back!

Those brave, beautiful daffodils are blooming in my yard again despite our very strange winter weather. They inspire me with their persistence. In the March 2019 edition of The View, I wrote an article about daffodils and their legend. In case you missed it, I've decided to reprint it here:

The Legend of the 'Lent Lily'

While Easter is still several months away, Lent is fast approaching and with it the flowering symbol of Spring, daffodils. You see them popping up all around yards here in Georgia. Despite cold weather, heavy rain, even wintry mix, the daffodils bravely bloom. Though their botanic name is narcissus, daffodils are sometimes called jonquils, and in England, because of their long association with Lent, they're known as the 'Lent Lily.'

How they got here is uncertain, but, according to lore, connecting the daffodil to not only a sign of winter's end but a lucky emblem of future prosperity, these flowers are found



throughout the world. In Wales, it's said that if you spot the first daffodil of the season, your next 12 months will be filled with wealth, and Chinese legend has it that if a daffodil bulb is forced to bloom during the New Year, it will bring good luck to your home.

The March birth flower and the 10th wedding anniversary flower, a gift of daffodils is said to ensure happiness. But always remember to present daffodils in a bunch.

The same legends that associate this cheerful flower with good fortune warn us that when given as a single bloom, a daffodil can foretell misfortune.

Smile when you look at the cheery yellow blooms in your yard and think of all that they represent.

New Hymnals are Coming!

The possibility of purchasing new hymnals has been discussed off and on over the past several years. Our current one, *The Presbyterian Hymnal*, was published 33 years ago and does not include more recent hymns and songs. At its May 2022 meeting, the worship committee endorsed the idea of buying *Glory to God*, the Presbyterian hymnbook published in 2013.

Reaching this goal was delayed until the start of 2023 because of more immediate needs. With the approval of Session, the new

hymnals have been ordered. We are getting 200 hymnals and the two-volume accompanist's version. To offset this expense, the worship committee is giving members of the congregation the opportunity to donate \$20 per hymnbook and dedicate each in honor or memory of friends and family members. Each hymnal will have a bookplate with the names of the donor and the person being honored or remembered.

We are starting to collect donations and dedications. A form will be put in the Sunday bulletin and in the narthex. Please consider donating one, two, or more hymnals to support the worship life of our church. Thanks to all who are helping to make this goal a reality.










CT COMMITTEE MEETING






KNIT'n' TITCH'n'More

Bella joins ONEsies for Lunch!



The FPC Choir: A Tradition of Excellence

As one of the newest members of the choir, I continue to be amazed by the quality of the music ministry at FPC. When I came to last year's Maundy Thursday service, I had lived in Georgia for 10 days. I settled into the pew, thinking wistfully about my friends who would be gathering for the Tenebrae service at my former church in New York.

A cantata on Maundy Thursday was a new experience for me. And frankly, my expectations for that evening were not very high – this was just a little church in rural Georgia after all. Well, I was blown away. The music obviously had been chosen and directed by a professional. The choir knew how to pronounce their vowels and sing as a unit. The instrumental ensemble was excellent. My homesickness ebbed a bit. I wanted to join that choir and make harmony with those people.

This year, as the FPC choir rehearses the Maundy Thursday cantata, I'm happy to be part of the musical team. A choral group is a team, after all, with each person doing his or her part to reach a common goal. Every week, the team suits up (in robes) and goes onto the field (the chancel) with the goal of singing an anthem that glorifies God and enhances the worship of the people. An "amen" or "hallelujah" (or even applause!) from the congregation is just icing on the cake.

Our coach, David Arvold, is respected across northeast Georgia as a music director and educator. Choir members, rookies and veterans alike, are constantly learning from him. He pushes us all to do our best without making us feel like we want to leave the field forever.



David's assistant coach and sidekick, James Geiger, is also an accomplished musician and accompanist. He makes it look easy when he's asked to add or change something at the last minute. He provides much-needed comic relief during Wednesday evening rehearsals. And his accompaniment to the warm-up tune, "Many Mumbling Mice." is classic.

Some of the all-stars on the choir team deserve special mention. Joyce Naivar, soprano and awesome sight reader, turned 89 last year and hardly ever misses a rehearsal or service. Several others faithfully participate despite physical setbacks that may tempt them to stay home. Dick Frost often handles the tenor part all by himself. Actually, everyone in men's

section (Dick, Ross, Bruce, Tony, and James) should get a trophy for singing boldly even though they're outnumbered by the women three to one.

This year's Maundy Thursday cantata, *Come to the Cross and Remember*, will be sung during the service the evening of Thursday, April 6th. Bring your friends, family, and "amens." No hallelujahs, please! It's Lent.
