#### June Communion to be served in the pews Nancy Webber

On June 4, the FPC congregation will receive communion in the pews, as it did before the Covid-19 restrictions. This has been requested by several members of our church family. It's been a long time, so please review these guidelines:

- ◆ The elements are served separately first the bread, then the cup.
- Servers will bring plates of bread to the ends of the pews (both aisle and window sides). People at each end of the pew will take their pieces of bread and (if necessary) pass the plate to those nearer the center of the pew.
- ♦ When the plate reaches roughly the CENTER of the pew, it is passed back to the server.
- ◆ Everyone is asked to hold their piece of bread until all are served. The pastor will lead us in partaking of the bread as a community.
- ◆ The same procedure will be followed for the trays of filled cups. Please help your neighbor when passing the tray by holding it for them as they take a cup.



## Harp Concert Returns

Friday Evening June 9, 7 p.m.

The twelfth annual Harp Concert returns to First Presbyterian Church on

Friday, June 9th. It is free and open to the public. The concert in the sanctuary is presented by the Adult Harp Retreat, a group of harpists who have been working on their harp skills at a weeklong retreat at Smithgall Woods.

There are 12 adult harpists and their two professional harp instructors who have spent this wonderful week together honing various harp skills and harp techniques. Our professsional harpists are Ellen Foster and Rachel Brandwine.

Ellen Foster serves as Second Harpist with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra and performs with Atlanta Opera, Atlanta Boys Choir, and with other orchestras throughout the United States. She maintains an active teaching studio in the Atlanta area. Ellen is a graduate of Eastman School of Music and holds a graduate certificate from Yale University.



Rachel Brandwine serves as Harp Professor on faculty at St John's University and at St. Olaf College in Minnesota. Among her many performance and composition accomplishments are first prize awards and grants in numerous regional and national competitions. Rachel has performed throughout the United States, Ireland, Taiwan, and China in solo, chamber, and orchestral appearances. She is a graduate of Juilliard and earned a doctorate from Stony Brook University.

Professional cellist Esther Morgan-Ellis will once again join the harpists in a guest performance with the ensemble. She is on the faculty of North Georgia College.

Presbyterian Women will host a reception following the concert and all harpists and attendees are invited to enjoy refreshments and mingle.







## The Stone of Destiny

If you saw any coverage of the coronation of King Charles III, you may have seen him sitting on a 400 year -old wooden chair. What was hard to make out was a stone under the seat that has been used in the corona-



tion of the kings and queens of England, Scotland, and Ireland from the distant past. As we peer into the mists of early Irish history, we see the arrival of an old holy man, another named Baruch, and at least one young woman named Tea Tephi. Their baggage included a stone and other relics, like a harp (as on the traditional flag of Ireland) from a faraway land. Tea Tephi ended up marrying into the Irish royal line and the holy man and his scribe spent some years bringing order and new ideas about the law and one God to the pagan worship of the native people.

There is biblical evidence that the Holy Man

may be none other than the prophet Jeremiah and his scribe Baruch, along with the daughter of Judah's last king, Zedekiah. Zedekiah was last seen as a captive with his sons, being led to their deaths at the hands of the Babylonians during the fall of Jerusalem. The Bible records that Jeremiah, Baruch and the King's daughters escaped to Egypt.

So, what is important about this "tale." Our faithful and sovereign God told David that there would never be a time that one of his descendants would not sit on his throne. God even said that only if we could stop the day following the night could this covenant be broken. So, if this stone is, (1) the stone that Jacob slept on during his dream of the "stairway to Heaven" that he anointed and, (2) was probably used during the anointing of the line of kings (20) from David to Zedekiah and, (3) through the latter's daughter to the kings and queens of the British Isles, then we have an awesome example of our Living God at work in our world and keeping his covenant until Jesus returns to sit on David's throne.

True or not, we can't ignore God's covenant with David or Jeremiah's mission in his first chapter, verse 10, to "uproot and plant" kingdoms. All we can do is trust and wait to see how it all turns out.
