Sometimes, You Have to "Let It Go"

A few years ago, my mother-in-law and I were driving around Oglethorpe County, Georgia. She was taking me to see one of the oldest Presbyterian Churches in Northeast Georgia, a church founded just 10 years after the birth of our nation. It was a church that was born out of a mission to the Native Americans, a church that birthed a Presbyterian seminary that still exists today, and a church that stood proud among its Baptist neighbors. As we drove by the white clapboard church with its peeling paint, we noticed that the church doors were opened. My mother-in-law and I decided that this was our opportunity to see the interior of this fine old church, so we went in. When we walked in, we noticed three people sitting in the front pew and a person standing in front of them. We had interrupted their session meeting. Those three people sitting in the pew were not just the members of session, but the last three members of the church. The person standing was their Executive Presbyter, who had come to moderate the meeting. I found out later that the Executive Presbyter had just told the session that "You never know when a Presbyterian minister might walk through your doors."

The members of the church were gracious and gave us a tour of the church. They showed us the balcony, which was not for overflow visitors, but for the slaves to sit because they could not sit with the white members of the congregation. They showed us the walls of their narthex that were lined with portraits of pastors past. As one of the life-long members of the church proudly told us the history of this Presbyterian church, my heart broke. This church had lived in the past so long that they no longer had a future.

It wasn't long after our visit that my mother-in-law told me that the church we had visited had been closed. The community created a fund to repair the leaking steeple and other structural issues that threaten to destroy this old, old building. The community is currently continuing their work to restore the church to its

former glory and resurrect it as a place for the community and reminder of the proud Presbyterian history of the county.

The problem with this historical church is that it couldn't let go of its past to embrace its future. That leads me to wonder: What are we holding onto as individuals that get in the way of us embracing God's future for us? Maybe, it's the insults and bullying we received as children that we still bear in our hearts. Those statements that told us that we weren't good enough, smart enough, pretty enough, or worthy enough. Maybe, it's some past hurt that still stings today. So, often, we can't embrace the good thing God is doing in our life now because we are clinging too tightly to something from our past. You can't reach out for something when your hands are already full. If we are to grow as individuals, then we need to let go of the weight of our past that we might embrace the hope of our future.

This is true not only for us as individuals, but for us as a church. In the words of Elsa from the Disney movie Frozen, sometimes you have to "Let it go", let go of all that binds us to our vision, our plans, and our ideals in order to embrace what God has in store for us as individuals and as a church. What is our church clinging to that gets in the way of God's plans for us, for our future? Are we clinging to our past, the early and exciting days of our ministry, when we were a start-up church meeting in an old restaurant? My sisters and brothers, the more we cling to our past the less able we are to embrace our future. We will never be the church that we were when we first started 26 years ago, but what we can be is who God is calling us to be here and now. We must let go of a vision of what was and embrace a vision of what can be. We must be willing to risk failure, to make mistakes, and to trust that God can use it all to the glory of His name in the building of His kingdom.





after the civil war, to oversee local gold mills and machinery of the Dahlonega mines.


During construction of the home, workers discovered a gold and quartz vein under the building.


ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING

One-Room School Houses

As the school year is about to start again, we may want to take a look back on the old one-room school houses.

America was growing quickly during the 1800s, and most families lived in small towns or on farms. As a result, schools were built close to where the children lived and these schools were very small.

One teacher taught multiple grades, usually grades first through seventh or eighth, similar to our elementary schools of today. The younger students were seated in the front of the room, with the older students in the back, as they grew larger and older.

Many of these schools were a woodenframe structure, about 20 feet wide by approximately 35 feet long, some with a metal roof. The floors were wooden and a pot-bellied stove provided the needed heat. These wooden schoolhouses were without running water, bathrooms, adequate lighting, or playgrounds

There were many one-room school houses used well into the early 1900's but most are now long gone, relegated to a simple page in a nearly-forgotten history book. Those still standing are now an integral part of historical villages. Here in Georgia, there are several that have been preserved.

The **Little Creek School** "one room school house" was one of 23 one-room, one-teacher schools in existence in 1871. It is the only remaining one room schoolhouse in Haralson County and one of a few in the state of Georgia.

According to travel@exploregeorgia.org this

was a traditional 19th century one-room school house, located in the rural farm community of Little Creek community of northwest



Haralson County, Georgia. This school room housed students and teachers until 1932, and was then consolidated with nearby schools.



The interior of the building included a raised area of 8' by 20' with the teacher's desk, and some student desks for individual instruction. A water

bucket and dipper were available, and outside

toilets were provided.

There were 1,016 people in one-room schools in the county in 1871. Little Creek ceased to be used as a school in 1932 with



most of the students attending Steadman.

The closest one to this area is Mechanicsville School located in Norcross.

Mechanicsville School was built in 1900, not far from the Buford Highway. According to Patch.com records show that in addition to teaching, the teachers in these small school houses were required also sweep the floors, gather wood, and build fires in the pot-bellied stoves during the winter months.

This school opened in 1911 and was in operation until 1939 when Gwinnett County consolidated schools and constructed larger

and better buildings. In 1923, records indicated that two teachers taught 87 students for a six and a half months school year. This school



taught the children of the mechanics who worked and lived in the area, thus its name. The <u>Gwinnett County Public School</u> system currently owns the building. The little building is a treasure trove of history with its original desks and some of the other furnishings.

In 1900, there were more than 7,000 of these one-room schools in the state of Georgia, but today only a select few of them have been preserved.
