Initially a few women decided they could help




by knitting baby caps to send to the Rivers of the World ministry. Rather than focusing on mission trips that they could not physically

Breaking Out of Self-Doubt

In August I received a text message from Clair Arvold sharing her joy and trepidations about being chosen to paint an 8-foot x 8-foot painting as part of Braselton's "ArtRageous" Festival. This event is an ongoing effort to bring art and beautification to the downtown. Last year the city of Braselton started this Festival at their Civic Center. This indoor-outdoor festival



featured artists showcasing their best works. In addition, 12 commissioned artists painted one side of the 8-foot cube on the Town Green, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., painting in front of many observers. Each 8-foot by 8-foot painting will be on display in various locations in downtown Braselton for at least one year.

Local artists were asked to submit their drawings and this year Clair decided to step out of her comfort zone and submit her design.

Many of you know how very talented Clair is, but at the same time, very humble about her abilities, and in many ways, very timid about sharing her artistic creations. Her design reflected those emotions.

Her painting is a self-portrait symbolizing her breaking-out of a glass

cube using a pencil. The cube represents the selfdoubt that traps us and as she said, *Art can set us free*.

Kim and I drove to Braselton on Saturday, September 9, to share in this experience and support Clair's efforts. It was fascinating to see the images



come alive and watch her techniques. Who knew that an ordinary pizza cutter is one of this artist's tools?

I texted her before the show to see how she



was doing and she shared her inspiration. Oh! Penny! I have a butterfly of encouragement from God! He landed on my practice cube on Monday while I was practice prepping and he fluttered around us saying notice me! Then I've seen him every day while I'm working on it.

Today I walked out the door for last minute adjustments to the painting and this is the first thing I saw! That's the scaffolding I'm using. I just stopped, praised God, and cried for a minute.



Throughout Saturday she said, *God kept* giving me songs in my head with the perfect words that I needed to hear.



At 5 p.m. most had finished their works but Clair, needed extra time. The project photographer took pictures of each artist with their completed painting but Clair needed extra time

to finish. Again, God was working with her as the picture could not be taken with the sun shining on the bottom half. She kept painting. She was exhausted and ready to give up when she heard God encouraging her to keep going. She truly believed His Power was

in that pencil. When she completed her masterpiece, a butterfly fluttered by her. For awhile she became discouraged but was reminded *With man this is impossible, but with God all things are possible."* (Matthew 19:26)





Sunday, October 29

We will celebrate the 8th annual Kirkin' o' the Tartans at First Presbyterian Church on Sunday, October 29, starting at 11 a.m. The service will be filled with pageantry: attendees



proudly wearing their plaids, a procession of more than 20 clan tartans into the sanctuary, the stirring sounds of piper Bill Lombardo, the chancel choir, the Beadle and our Pastor, the flag of Scotland, the Rampant Lion

flag, the American Flag, and the Church flag. The Presbyterian Church has its roots in the Church of Scotland.

John Rogers brought the Kirkin' to First Presbyterian in October 2014, and it has been celebrated here every year since, with a brief hiatus due to the Covid Pandemic.

John shared some of his memories: Andy Chambers was the Pastor at the time. I was the chairman, and we had a great committee including Judy Winski, Becky Clark, and Dave Arvold. We had 21 family tartans for the first celebration. The fabric came from Zelina Shaw "the Tartan Lady' in Lakeland, GA. Becky did the sewing and I placed the names of the clans on the tartan banners. David Gregory was the piper. We had tea and shortbread afterwards. While a celebration of Scottish heritage, the Kirkin' is distinctly American, tracing its roots to the life



and ministry of the Reverend Dr. Peter Marshall, a Scottish emigre. Dr. Marshall was a prominent minister in the Presbyterian Church, who served as the Chaplain to the United States Senate at the advent of World War II. In April 1941, while serving as the minister of the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in Washington, D.C., Dr. Marshall titled one of his sermons Kirkin' o' the *Tartan*. His idea was to promote the plight of orphaned children in Scotland as a result of WW2 and to make the people of this country aware of it. The name Kirkin' o' the Tartan soon became attached to church services that celebrate with pride their Scottish heritage, including in Scotland! Interestingly, when the Kirkin' was first introduced in Scotland they scoffed at Americans' efforts to be Scottish. Now, it is one of the biggest events in Scotland.

Join us **Sunday morning, October 29 at 11 a.m.** for the Kirkin' o' the Tartans **followed by a 5**th **Sunday Lunch**. All are welcome. Photos and coverage of this year's celebration to follow in the November edition of The View.

Judy Winski was in charge of a special Ceilidh meal served on the evening prior to the first event. At the time we would process from the Cleveland Square carrying the banners into the

church. It was quite a sight. John served as chairman of the event for many years and the tradition he started lives on.



Reflections While Waiting on Hold

Since I moved out of state, I've spent a lot of time waiting on hold for a representative to assist me as I've cancelled or added services, and updated my account information. My record call waiting time so far is 62 minutes. This was for Social Security to change my address from Georgia to Arkansas! I held that long because I didn't want to lose my place in line and start all over again. Out of curiosity, I went online to find out how long the average person is willing to wait on hold. Apparently, it varies by category, ranging from ordering Pizza to dealing with the government.

An article in Tech-With-Tech tells us, *If you* ever have to call into a government agency, then you can almost guarantee a long hold time.

The worst part is that you're only calling because there's a legal obligation. The problem



They know that you'll wait as long as it takes, and there's no real incentive to improve customer satisfaction.

As I've worshipped remotely and thanked God for blessings and a safe journey, I've been thinking how fortunate we are as Christians to have a direct line to God. He knows all about us --- who, what, and where we are and he has given us a direct line to Him, through prayer. According to Pastor Rick Warren writing in his Daily Hope Devotional, You now have direct access to God. You don't have to pray through anybody else. You don't have to confess through anybody else. You don't have to fellowship with God through anybody else. Read your Bible, talk with the Lord, and fellowship directly with him.

Be sure to set aside time every day to connect with God. You have a direct line, 24/7.

WHAT IS PW?



The Presbyterian Men are planning a special event in celebration of Veterans Day. Plans are in process for the retirement of American flags on Veterans Day, November 11, Saturday, at the church, by the local Boy Scouts.

Flags that are faded or torn will be collected at the church beginning in mid-October. Watch for specific details in the Sunday Bulletin.

In 1937, he American Legion passed a resolution about flag retirement ceremonies, and they've been an important ritual ever since.



According to the U.S. Flag Code, *The flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning.* This is the preferred way to dispose of a flag. The ceremony involves two color guards, one for the flag currently in use and a special color guard for the flag to be retired from service.

Set aside that day for a patriotic ceremony and honor all veterans who have served this country so well. We owe our veterans our gratitude for their willingness to serve on our behalf.



She was obviously grieving. We gave her a brochure and invited her and her family to our church services. We also invited her to Knit and Stitch. On Sunday, she and her family were not in church. She did not come to Knit and Stitch. I was disappointed.

Fast forward to Agrifest 2023. This same young lady visited our booth. She had misplaced our brochure, couldn't remember our name, and knew only that we had a white church building. She came to Agrifest looking for us. We talked for a while and she mentioned that she missed her grandmother and when she wore her shawl, it felt as if she were receiving a hug. Her children love the shawl and love to wear it – to feel a hug? She is now helping to care for her husband's grandparents who are in hospice care. This lovely spirit brought us beads that she wasn't using for us to make into something to sell for our mission work. She also brought us a crocheted cuddly toy for a baby that we might sell.

Lesson learned – Agrifest is more than selling our wares to fund our mission work, it is about being the hands, feet, and spirit of Christ in the community. Let us continue to be a presence in the community, because we never know how we might impact the life of one person, just one dear person in our White County Community.


