Setting Sail, Part 2: What is Discernment?



This month's Pastor's Ponderings comprises selections from the sermon "Are You Listening?" which was given on Jan. 14.

What is discernment?

According to the dictionary, *discern* means "to perceive or recognize the difference between two or more things;" to "distinguish (between) or

separate (by sifting)." Discernment is the practice of discerning: the practice of perceiving, distinguishing, and separating by sifting. When we speak of practicing discernment in the church, we are speaking of seeking to perceive God's will and way for us as individuals by sifting through the myriad of voices that demand our attention, in order to attune ourselves to the one voice that matters, the voice of God speaking to our hearts.

What does the practice of discernment look like?

Discernment is about listening for God and to God in the myriad of ways God may speak to us. As children, we are taught that prayer is talking to God, and there is nothing wrong with talking to God. The problem comes when we spend our prayer time talking at God, not listening for God. One of the principles of prayer that we frequently forget (or ignore) is that prayer involves listening.

In our prayers to God, we are quick to speak and to make our litany of requests — our lists of what we want and need God to do for us — but we are slow to listen to and for God. We are slow to take the time to be silent before God. However, many times, it is *in* the silence where we hear God's call for us and our church, and sometimes it *is* the silence that is God's voice speaking to us. Silence is not the only way God speaks to us. He also speaks audibly and in the urgings of our hearts that move us to act in love. He speaks to us in our minds, inspiring our words that we might speak in ways that build each other up rather than tear each other down.

Discernment is an act of the community. We need others to help us listen for the word of God and recognize it when we hear it. As expressed by Presbyterian minister Beth Scibienski, "Wisdom is found in the collective of God's people. Discernment comes when many listeners engage prayerfully listening together."

We need each other to listen for the word of God and to recognize it when we hear it — to make sure that we hear God correctly. Discernment requires all of us to brave silence and listen for God to speak in it and through it, and then, to share our thoughts on how God is speaking to us with one another, to pray to-gether about those thoughts, and, ultimately, to determine together if we have heard God rightly.

Discernment might involve waiting. We may have to sit in silence listening for a long time. We may not feel anything as we pray. However, God will not be silent forever. Waiting to hear God speak gives us time to open our ears more fully to his voice in the silence, it gives us time to search and see where God is at work, and it gives us the opportunity to prepare ourselves for whatever it is he may be calling us to do. God's silence isn't punishment; it's blessing, because in the waiting God is preparing you and me and our church for what is next — even if we can't discern it at this time.

How do we know we have heard God's word?

A word from God will never contradict who God is. And who is God? God is love. John writes in 1 John 4:16b: "God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them."

A word from God will be in line with what Jesus named as the important commandments: loving God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength, and loving our neighbor as we love ourselves. If

what you hear does not help you love God with your whole being and love your neighbor as yourself, then it isn't the word of God.


Questions for thought

Are you taking time to sit in the silence and listen for his voice?

Are you seeking the wisdom of others to help you hear and respond to the voice of God?

Are you letting yourself rest in the waiting, knowing that God is preparing you for something more than you could ever imagine?

Fellowship Hall roof to be repaired

The Session has approved the repair of the Fellowship Hall roof to stop a number of leaks. Cory Anderson with Anderson Roofing in Cleveland was chosen to complete the work for an estimated \$13,100.

The project will include removing the old roof surface and repairing any rotten wood. The contractor will install foam board as insulation, a waterproof barrier, and new metal roofing. The contract includes a guarantee that it will solve the leak problem.

Work is expected to begin in early February, weather permitting.

This year Ash Wednesday falls on Feb. 14, 46 days before Easter Sunday. It is the first day of Lent, a period of contemplation, confession, and repentance. A brief

service will be held at FPC at 6 p.m.

The "imposition of ashes" usually occurs during the service. The pastor invites members of the congregation to come to the front of the church, where she uses ash and oil to draw a small cross on their foreheads. From the time of the Old Testament, putting ashes on one's head has signified mourning and penitence.

The observation of Lent originated in the Roman Catholic Church and has since been

adopted by Protestant churches as well. The 40 days of Lent correspond to the 40 days Jesus fasted in the wilderness following his baptism (Sundays are not considered part of the Lenten period). Traditionally, those observing Lent would fast for one or more days a week. In recent years, instead of giving up food, some Christians choose to give up another activity as a sign of penitence, such as playing video games or posting on social media.

Daily Bible readings now on Facebook page

Perhaps one of your New Year resolutions is to read the Bible daily. Or you need some guidance on what Scripture to read.

The FPCC Facebook page now provides a list of Bible readings for each day of the week. A new post will be made each Monday. The readings are based on the three-year rotation known as the Revised Common Lectionary. The lectionary usually includes readings from the Old Testament, the Psalms, and the New Testament, and also is used as a basis for the pastor's sermon each week.

In this schedule, you will read the lectionary passages in the week leading up to the Sunday that may



be used in church. It should give you an opportunity to think and pray about the Scriptures before hearing the sermon or Sunday School lesson. Think of it as getting ready for Sunday!



CHRISTMAS COLLECTIONS





Pastor shares training program with focus group

Pastor Burnetta presented a training program to a focus group of elders and deacons on Jan. 18 as part of her work toward a Level II Certificate in Older Adult Ministry.

Currently a work in progress, the program is designed to support caregivers of older adults with dementia and dementia-related illnesses. Pastor B created the three-hour session based on her research and experience in this area. Primarily, the training provided information on how to communicate with dementia patients in positive and supportive ways.

The group watched several informative videos, participated in small group discussions, and did some "improv" role-playing. At the end of the session, several said that they had learned new

things about dementia even though in the past they had cared for family members with these illnesses.



The OAM Certificate Program is offered by Columbia Theological Seminary. Pastor Burnetta already has a Level I certificate based on her coursework. The dementia training is a capstone project that is required for a Level II certification. The project eventually will be evaluated by her sponsor and, if approved, may be made available for caregiver training throughout the Presbytery.
