For centuries, the voices of slaves, Native Americans, children, and women were left out of the history books we studied in school and the stories we were told in church.

You probably knew that John Kerry is a former Secretary of State and presidential nominee, but did you know that Margaret Chase Smith was the first woman to be nominated for President by a major political party (the Republican Party)?

You probably knew that Abraham Lincoln was a U.S. President and a lawyer, but did you know that Arabella Mansfield was the first woman in the U.S. to earn a license to practice law?

I'm betting most of you knew that John Glenn was an astronaut and the first American to orbit the Earth, but did you know that Valentina Tereshkova, a Russian cosmonaut, was the first woman in space?

In the history of medicine, you have heard of Jonas Salk, whose polio vaccine saved millions of lives, but have you heard of Dr. Elizabeth Blackwell, the first woman to practice medicine in the U.S.?

In sports history, we remember the accomplishments of boxers like Muhammad Ali, but not those of Barbara Buttrick ("Battling Barbara"), who was the women's world boxing champion in the 1940s and 1950s and participated in the first televised women's boxing match.

Even the church is guilty of missing voices as it tells its story of what it is, how it came to be, and who shaped it. We celebrate St. Patrick's Day, but we don't remember St. Monica, the mother of St. Augustine, who prayed fervently for her son to become a Christian and, by doing so, helped bring to the faith one of its most influential figures.

You probably didn't know that Antoinette Black-well was the first woman to be ordained by a major denomination (the Congregational Church – today's UCC), and that Margaret Towner was the first woman to be ordained a Minister of Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church. I bet you did know, however, about Fred Rogers, a Presbyterian minister and famous children's television personality.

You may have known that Joseph Smith was the founder of the Mormon Church (The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints), but did you know that Mary Baker Eddy was the first woman to found a major religion, the Church of Christ – Scientist?

March is Women's History Month. During this month we celebrate and give voice to the countless woman whose God-given gifts were overlooked and neglected by history – our nation's, our world's, and even our church's. We celebrate that God has given us all a place in his plan, not based on our gender, but simply on his love for each of us. We celebrate that in Christ there is no male or female, but only who we are: children of God, gifted by God to fulfill a purpose in this world.

Holy Week traditions focus on Christ's sacrifice



Across history, Christians have remembered Christ's death and resurrection each year at around the time of the Jewish Passover. In 325 the Council of Nicaea decided the date of Easter

would be determined by an obscure set of calculations based on the date of the spring equinox and the cycles of the moon.

The earliest celebration of the resurrection was preceded by a day of fasting and a night of readings and prayers, according to David Gambrell, associate for worship in the PC(USA) Office of Theology and Worship. Over the first few centuries of the church's history, however, this simple day of fasting grew to an entire week. The days leading up to Easter came to be connected with particular events in the Gospels —

Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, his Passover meal with the disciples, and his death on the cross.

- The Sunday before Easter (Palm Sunday) is observed with the distribution of palm leaves to the congregation, recalling Christ's "triumphal entry" into Jerusalem for the Passover feast.
- The fifth day of Holy Week (Maundy Thursday) marks Jesus' "last supper" with his disciples, his betrayal, and his arrest.
 "Maundy" comes from the Latin word mandatum (commandment) and refers to Jesus' commandment to his disciples that they love one another.
- The sixth day (Good Friday) is a solemn remembrance of Christ's death on the cross for the life of the world. Good Friday services often are held at the time Jesus died (the ninth hour, or 3 p.m.).

Holy Week at FPC

Palm Sunday, March 24

At the 11 a.m. worship service, get your palm leaf at the door and join in singing, "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!"

Holy Wednesday, March 27

This year we will have a "Service of Wholeness" at 12:30 p.m. in the sanctuary. This service will provide a space for those who want to pray with others over the needs in their lives, whether they are seeking healing or wholeness for themselves or a loved one.

Maundy Thursday, March 28

The 7 p.m. service includes the choir's presentation of *Come Walk With Me*, a cantata by Pepper Choplin (see page 5). Worshipers also will join in communion and an observance of the Tenebrae tradition.

What is Tenebrae?

The Tenebrae (Latin for "shadows" or "darkness") service allows us to remember the events surrounding Jesus' death in a profoundly physical way.

The service begins with a number of lit candles at the front of the church and a series of Bible readings. After each reading, a candle is extinguished. Finally, just one candle is left. The church is cast into darkness, except for the continual light of the Christ candle.

As the congregation is gradually immersed into a physical setting of darkness, we reflect on Jesus' suffering, his separation from the Father, and the seriousness of our sin.

The solemn mood continues as we leave the church in silence, beginning the wait for resurrection day.



Cantata follows Christ's final steps


The FPC Chancel Choir, under the direction of Music Director David Arvold, will present a cantata during the Maundy Thursday service at 7 p.m. on March 28.

Come Walk With Me is a dramatic setting of the Passion story in which a narrator leads us from scene to scene, retracing Christ's path during his last days on earth.

Monologues from those witnessing or participating in Christ's final steps enhance the stark reality of each scene with their observations, frustrations, and fears.

The music, written by noted composer Pepper Choplin, supplies the drama and passion through its mix of styles that range from classical to Appalachian, bluegrass, and Celtic folk traditions.

The choir will be accompanied by keyboardist James Geiger and a group of professional instrumentalists.

FPC women to attend Annual Gathering in March
